



Blue Bioeconomy – towards a strong and sustainable EU algae sector

The initiative aims at increasing sustainable production, ensure safe consumption and boost innovative use of algae and algae-based products in Europe.

Option 1: No policy change.

Option 2: <u>Targeted activities to support the sustainable growth of the algae</u> <u>sector:</u> 5 objectives

- 1. Improving governance framework e.g. guidance on sustainable production, large scale cultivation of algae, standardization, recommendations etc
- 2. Support functioning of the market novel algae species, funding mechanisms

Algae are regarded as a functional group of organisms consisting of microalgae, macroalgae, cyanobacteria and labyrinthulomycetes (CEN:17399:2020)

Blue Bioeconomy – towards a strong and sustainable EU algae sector

- 3. **Improving business environment** specific funding needs, one-stop-shop/assistance mechanism
- 4. **Increasing social awareness and acceptance** communication campaigns, labelling, inclusion into MSP processes
- 5. Closing knowledge, research and innovation gaps developing improved algae cultivation and processing systems, new methods, carbon sequestration quantification etc

Option 3: Targeted activities to support the sustainable growth of the algae sector including regulatory measures – inter alia for harvesting of live seaweed, targets to substitute fish based fish feed, better integration into CFP (on top of option 2)

Towards a strong and sustainable EU algae sector – conclusions from the public consultation

The European Commission is preparing a comprehensive cross-sectoral EU algae initiative. The aim of the initiative is to increase the sustainable production, consumption and use of algae and algae-based

products. Because of their small carbon and environmental footprint, raising the profile of algae will help achieve the objectives of the European Green Deal, the transition to a green, circular and carbon-neutral EU.
